Module 2 = Human rights	This unit considers what human rights are, why we have them and explores a range of case studies of abuses, people who have fought for human rights and an evaluation of the methods to protect them. Module 3 = Creation and the environment	At the core of this unit are the ultimate questions about the purpose of human existence on the Earth and how the universe began, the purpose of human life and what it is that makes us distinctly human. The idea of the soul is central to our understanding of the purpose of human life. We consider the religious beliefs and teachings about the spiritual dimension of human life.	
Module 4 = Sexual Health Education	This unit will consider all aspects of sex and relationships. They will study differences in types of relationship, good/bad relationships, conception, contraception, the prevention of infection and the law relating to relationships. Students will also consider gay relationships. They will also look at how religious views can impact on these issues.
